<p>What does a Speech-Language Pathologist do?</p>	<p>Prevent, assess, diagnose, and treat communication disorders and feeding/swallowing disorders.</p> <p>Examples:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Fluency/Stuttering -Articulation/Speech sounds -Language disorders -Traumatic Brain Injury -Communication Modalities -Social Communication -Voice/Resonance -Hearing Loss -Cognitive Communication (such as memory, problem solving, and organizing information) -Feeding and Swallowing Difficulties
<p>Who do Speech Pathologists work with?</p>	<p>Individuals from of all ages, starting as early as birth</p>
<p>Where do Speech Pathologists work?</p>	<p>Hospitals (like Childrens Wisconsin!)</p> <p>Private practices/clinics</p> <p>Schools</p> <p>Skilled nursing facilities</p> <p>Universities</p> <p>Remote (telehealth)</p>
<p>Education Needed</p>	<p>Master's Degree</p>
